
Cone Snake #12

Jason Clark

Jason Clark of Southeastern Reptile Rescue entertained Griffin Rotarians and our quests with an explanation of his start and continued work with reptiles. Jason explained that he became interested in snakes as a young boy growing up in Griffin. He recalled that as a seventh grader at Taylor Street Middle School, he called Spalding County 911 and told them he liked snakes and could catch them if they received calls for that service. The 911 operator promptly told him that she hated snakes but asked for his name and telephone number to contact him. He admitted that he had not thoroughly thought through his new business plan because he realized he had no driver's license or transportation if he were called. But, that first impetus at reptile rescue grew and he now owns and operates Southeastern Reptile Rescue with his wife and family. Clark's reputation and

notoriety also have grown. The Animal Planet television network contacted him to be part of a special on reptiles of the South. After filming the special, the network called wanting to expand the planned one-hour special into a series. Jason has since consulted and assisted with movies and other TV shows. He is the Alligator Agent for Georgia, and he also has an agreement with the State to assist with reptiles which makes him to be on-call 24/7. In this role, he has inspected many homes after the law enforcement invasions and arrests throughout the state. Clark then showed and talked about snakes he brought. He first showed a rat snake which he said is the most common and harmless snake in Georgia. He then showed a king snake which he noted is known for preying upon and eating other snakes. He emphasized that the common feeling that "the only good snake is a dead snake" is incorrect and he added that, in Georgia, non-venomous snakes are protected by law. He then shifted to venomous snakes saying that more people are bitten by copperheads than any other snake in Georgia. Although copperheads are not aggressive, most people are bitten within 2-3 minutes after seeing the snake as they try to kill or

catch it. Jason called up John Quinn to help demonstrate the similar appearance of corn snakes and copperheads. John's close encounter was with the corn snake. But, Jason produced a copperhead (without John's help) to point out that they can be identified by the shapes that look like Hershey kisses along the sides of the body. Clark also mentioned the cottonmouth as a venomous snake that lives in and around bodies of surface water and has very poor eyesight. He added that to identify venomous snakes, one cannot rely on the triangular shape of the head because many non-venomous snakes will change their head shape as a means of mimicking venomous snakes




to the protect themselves when cornered. Eye snape is also not a good identifying character because the eye shape of venomous snakes may become more ovoid at night to allow entry of more light. More information on Southeastern Reptile Rescue can be found at their website, snakesareus.com.
