THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM Can Tax Credit Stem Hospital Closures?

Kathleen Smith, Regional Development Officer with the WellStar Foundation, is hopeful that the newlyenacted Georgia Rural Hospital Organization Expense Tax Credit Program will help prevent further closures of hospitals located in Georgia's rural communities and areas. Research shows that 25 states have seen at least one rural hospital close since 2010. Most of those closures have occurred in the South. Georgia is ranked third on the list with 7 closures. Texas with 13 closures and Tennessee with 8 are first and second on that list. In all, 81 rural hospitals have closed since 2010, and another 672 are in dire and immediate danger of closing. Smith says that Georgia's Tax Credit Program, signed into law last May and launched in June, is targeting 49 Georgia hospitals and looks very much like the tax credit program for not-for-profit private schools. Each hospital could receive as much as \$4 million from the program to assist in meeting expenses and shortfalls. WellStar's only hospital among those

49 is Sylvan Grove located in neighboring Jackson. Smith asked all in the audience to consider the impact that closure of Sylvan Grove would have. First, those employed by the hospital would lose their jobs causing an economic impact in the community. Also, emergency treatment would become critically important because it is no longer 'local'. There will be delays in treatment and medical attention. And, hospitals in surrounding communities will receive the load of patients who were previously served by the closed hospital. Sylvan Grove serves over 15,000 patients each year. Patient satisfaction scores are always very high. Their 25-bed rehabilitative care facility serves 7 surrounding counties, including Spalding. Smith explained that the closure of Sylvan Grove would have drastic impacts here in Griffin with the WellStar Spalding Regional Hospital. Smith further explained that Sylvan Grove is a 55-year-old structure (oldest in the WellStar system) which needs upgrades and expansion, especially in the outpatient services. They depend upon philanthropy. Funds generated by the Rural Hospital Tax Credit Program can be used to defray administrative costs and in renovations and new construction.
